Module Description	<p>The International NGO Law and Policy Project (INLPP) provides free legal, policy, research, communications, and advocacy services to NGOs and nonprofits around the world. INLPP clients include human rights organizations in Switzerland and globally. Although our legal expertise is limited to questions of Swiss, U.S. and international law, our policy-related research and advocacy expertise is global in scope. The work is conducted primarily in English. The INLPP is staffed by students in the ZHAW's School of Management and Law working under the supervision of the Director, Dr. Nyasa Steger. The INLPP provides ZHAW students with an opportunity to use the knowledge and skills developed through their academic coursework to solve real-world challenges for clients. ZHAW students provide client services to NGOs and nonprofits working in a wide range of cultural, political, and legal environments. Students collaborate in assigned groups to develop teamwork, interview, and problem-solving skills through research, writing, communication, advocacy, and creative thinking in order to meet the clients' needs.</p>

This project-based module generally follows a standard 14-week semester schedule through a combination of in-person and virtual engagement among student teams, the Project Director, and NGO clients.

There is a mandatory pre-semester class meeting (online), two weeks before the start of the semester.

- **Pre-Semester Class Meeting:** One pre-semester all-class meeting, two weeks before the start of the semester (online). During this meeting, students are assigned to client organizations and project groups. After this class meeting, during the two weeks leading up to the start of the semester, students are expected to prepare for the semester by learning about their clients, engaging in background research and project planning. Students are required to participate in three additional structured all-class meetings throughout the semester:
- **Mid-Semester All-Class Meeting:** These meetings focus on identifying challenges, group problem-solving, and receiving feedback on work-in-progress presentations. This class meeting also covers key themes such as intercultural collaboration and cultural competency.
- **Final Presentations – Final Two Weeks of Semester:** Each group presents its work, reflects on the project experience, and discusses issues encountered (e.g., defining project scope, managing client expectations, obtaining feedback), along with strategies used to address them.

Independent Work Requirement

In addition to the all-class seminars and the weekly supervision meetings with the Director, students are expected to dedicate at least 5 hours per week to independent, substantive work on their client assignments. This includes regular communication with group members and clients, as well as research, drafting, and preparation tasks related to the project deliverables.
